School Overview

Having registered as an independent school in January 2008, Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne (LCCC) completed its 17th year of existence at the end of 2024. LCCC is dedicated to helping Christian families (especially of Pentecostal persuasion) by providing affordable and good quality Christian education for their children. As an independent school, we are committed to providing the choice that many Christian families are looking for in terms of the type of education for their children. In 2008 LCCC only received registration for classes from Prep to Year 8. We received approval to go up to Year 10 as of 2011 and approval for Year 11 and Year 12 as of 2012 and 2013 respectively. In 2024, we had our twelfth cohort of Year 12 students graduate from our school. There were 51 Year 12 students in 2024. In terms of VCE subjects, we continue to offer 13 subjects and a few more by Distance Education (Virtual School Victoria) and VSL. Over the years, God has helped us hold on to the heavenly vision and the school has continued to experience strong enrolment growth, increased staff numbers, many new facilities etc. Our students continue to perform exceptionally well in the NAPLAN tests, showing that the school-home partnership is continuing to bear fruit. All our VCE students obtained a VCE certificate. We did not have any indigenous students at our school in 2024. Our vision to serve the indigenous community is still strong and only God can enable us to help them. The growth of our school population is being restricted by Department of Transport's condition requiring a traffic signaled intersection for LCCC before any growth beyond 1000 students. We were given a permit to have up to 1000 students on condition that we construct a traffic light intersection for entry and exit. This could cost LCCC in excess of \$4 million for a project that is for the benefit of all travelers on South Gippsland Highway, Devon Road users and for those using our school. The increased traffic on the Highway is not mainly due to LCCC's growth instead it is mainly due to the accelerated growth of our Casey community. We have requested financial help from the state government in this matter but we are yet to hear conclusively of any amount they are willing to commit to this project. We give thanks to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has helped us thus far and to the school community that has stood by the vision of the school.

Vision

To build a unique school that will equip a Godly and skilled generation to reach their God-given destiny and transform their community.

Enrolment

At census 2024, the enrolment at LCCC was 1020 students. Of these 547 were male and 473 female students. We did not have any indigenous students.

In 2024 all year levels were double streamed and there had to be a third class of Grade 6 students to cope with the larger number of Grade 6 students. We had up to two teachers and three teacher's aides to help in the large classes. Most of our permanent teacher's aides are tertiary graduates or doing tertiary studies. When there are enough classrooms all the Primary classes will be triple streamed.

'Word of mouth' continues to be our only form of advertisement and the stable enrolment is God's favour and partly a reflection of parent satisfaction with the school's vision.

Average **student attendance** during the Student Attendance Data Collection period was 93% (up from 91% in 2023). 74.6% (up from 66% in 2023) of our students attended 90% or more of the days. Preps and VCE student attendance were not included in the data. The attendance of students is excellent. Generally, students were away only due to illness except in some cases where they had to visit families overseas as many of our students have grandparents overseas.

Student non-attendance is carefully monitored by the marking of attendance twice a day (at 9.00am and at 2.00pm). If no phone call is received by 9.30am on the day of absence, the office staff will contact the parents to determine reason for absence. In addition, a note for absence must be written in the student's diary by the parent, to be presented to the class teacher. Whole school absences are recorded daily in a diary at the front desk. Late arrivals and early dismissals are also recorded in separate folders at the main office. Attendance is also maintained in electronic form for the purpose of reporting to the government.

There were no indigenous staff employed at the school in 2024.

We had about 40 casual staff on top of the 131 staff who were permanent during the year so the administration had to keep track of over 170 staff.

Staff signed in daily to show attendance and any absence required the completion of a leave form. Electronic sign in and sign out has been well received by all staff at LCCC.

Staff attendance in 2024 was as outstanding as always. The dedication of LCCC staff was exceptional. Once again, no external casual relief teachers were employed as all absences were replaced internally. This was a financial saving to the school and also provided better continuity of study for our students.

Average full-time teacher attendance rate for 2024 was 98% (not taking into consideration leave taken without pay). Average attendance rate for full time teacher aides was 99%. 10 staff left over the 2024 year. Staff who left were made up of 4 teachers, 5 teacher's aides and 1 maintenance staff. Attrition rate of about 7.5%

More than 40 of our ex-students, most of whom were attending tertiary studies did casual part time work at the school.

Teacher Qualifications

All LCCC teachers are registered with the Victorian Institute of Teaching and hence hold suitable qualifications to teach in Victoria. Teachers hold degrees ranging from Bachelors to PhD in their areas of speciality. Almost all our teacher's aides hold at least a Bachelors degree. Our team of teachers, with considerable years of teaching experience, are dedicated to making sure that students succeed academically. All Literacy and Numeracy from Prep to Year 12 are taught by specialist staff (that is, they have majored in the area). Some staff continued to offer after school classes to tutor students. VCE teachers held after school and holiday classes to help our students succeed and the school is grateful for their dedication. Our teachers are also capable of caring for the whole person because of their spiritual commitment. They attended weekly staff meetings, various staff (professional development) in-services (10 days set aside for PD) and external professional development meetings to improve their ability to serve the students.

Student Progress & Achievements

Student Learning

Our students continue to maintain excellent academic progress due to the combined efforts of teachers and parents. Students had a good attitude to study and were committed to doing homework.

Victoria's 100 best-performing primary schools and 100 top secondary schools under NAPLAN have been revealed, with principals saying that regardless of a student's background, if they set high expectations they can succeed.

Analysis of the 2024 NAPLAN results by *The Age* shows select-entry schools such as Melbourne High School and Mac.Robertson Girls' High School were among the secondary schools topping the list.

Other government schools to make the grade included Balwyn High, Glen Waverley, McKinnon and Port Melbourne secondary colleges and Frankston High School.

State primary schools including Harrietville, Strathewen, Thomastown East and Oakleigh South also made the list, along with Birrale Primary School in Doncaster East.

Also among the best were schools with combined primary and high school cohorts, including Ballarat Clarendon College, Haileybury, Camberwell Grammar, Presbyterian Ladies' College, Fintona Girls' School and Scotch College.

Schools on the list are given in alphabetical order and not ranked in order of achievement, because the results reflect raw test data and are not weighted for schools' socioeconomic status.

Not all the high-achievers were high-fee-paying schools. At Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne, where fees are on average less than \$2000 a year, the school's results were anything but ordinary.

The co-educational college in Melbourne's south-east was one of the strongest-performing secondary schools in the state. Its results place it among the top 10 secondary schools and among the top-four independent schools.

NAPLAN (National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy) tests are sat in March by all students in years 3, 5, 7 and 9 and assess their reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy.

On all counts at all-year levels, Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne's students performed well above average.

It's a result that backs up the school's performance in previous years and which makes principal Jacob Mathews incredibly proud.

Mathews says the results are all the more impressive given more than 90 per cent of the school's students have a language background other than English, and about 10 per cent of the school's 1015 students are refugees.

Most students are of African heritage, but there are also students of Samoan, Indian, Sri Lankan and Indonesian heritage.

"It's amazing how they come together as one and all work together," he said.

Mathews, who is from Malaysia, has been at the school since it opened in 2008. He said the results were a tribute to a combination of factors, including the students' Christian faith, families' high level of engagement and teachers' dedication to students' success.

He also pointed to the school's tutoring program, which begins before the school year starts and runs through the year, and also highlighted the time that former students give by returning to the school to help with marking and checking homework.

"It's good for them to earn some money to pay off their student debt," he said. "They know how the school runs and understand students."

Mathews said he also regularly used the school newsletter to remind parents of the negative impact of social media, pointing out that it distracted students from their studies. ...

The top performing NAPLAN schools in suburban areas delivering best bang for buck

Low-fee private schools and suburban state schools are offering a top-quality schooling for a fraction of the price of prestigious private schools, new NAPLAN data shows. See where your school ranks.

Low-fee private schools and suburban state schools are offering a top-quality education for a fraction of the price of expensive private schools, new NAPLAN data shows.

Analysis of the top 100 secondary and primary schools shows some superstar providers beating, or performing just as well as, elite colleges.

Top of the secondary list are the [four selective state schools](#), Melbourne High, MacRobertson Girls' High, Nossal High and Suzanne Cory High. Each has a combined year nine average NAPLAN score of 670 or more.

Meanwhile **Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne posted a year nine average score across all five domains – reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy – of 666.**

Other lower-cost private schools beating big-name elite colleges such as Scotch College, Methodist Ladies' College and Melbourne Grammar, include Harkaway Hills College in Narre Warren North and St Andrews Christian College in Wantirna South.

Apart from the four selective schools, there are 23 government schools in the secondary [top 100 list](#), led by Glen Waverley Secondary College, which posted an impressive average year nine score of 626.4.

Other top state secondary performers include Victorian College of the Arts, McKinnon Secondary College, Highvale Secondary College and Balwyn High School.

Exclusive independent schools Haileybury College and Presbyterian Ladies' College were the two highest-performing schools in primary education, achieving year five averages of 592.8 and 589.4 respectively.

Some public schools performed just as well as their private counterparts in NAPLAN.

But it wasn't just the prestigious private schools achieving great results, with students at a number of more affordable Christian and government schools also obtaining top marks.

Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne, where school fees start from \$2800 for a grade five student, scored the third-highest average NAPLAN rank out of the primary school cohort.

Mentone Girls' Grammar and Scotch College were outdone by multiple public primary schools with fees a fraction of the cost of the wealthy private providers.

There were many more articles about our school in newspapers but these should give you an impression of how well your children performed. Let us not become weary of what we are doing in our homes and at school.

Having looked at these and other articles we did a comparison of performances in 2023 and 2024 for some of the top secondary schools and came up with this table:

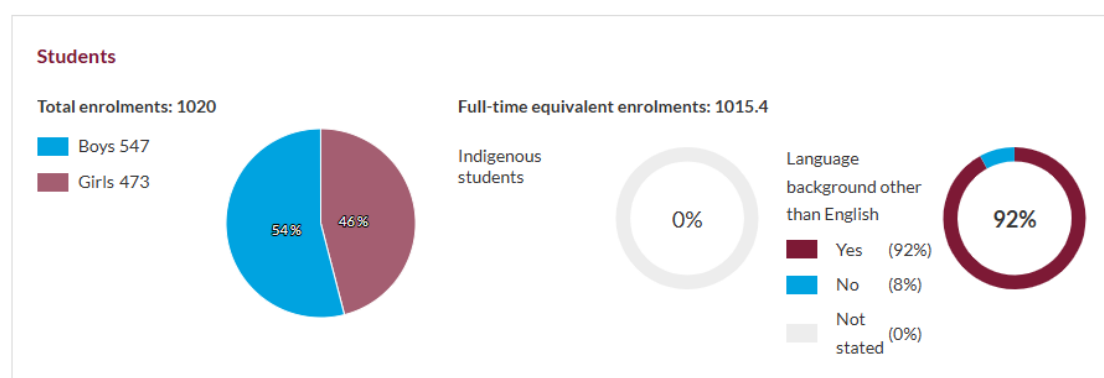

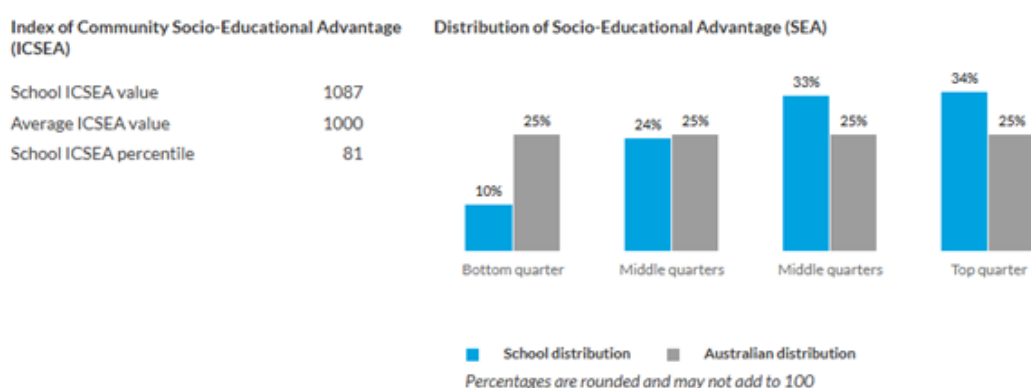
The data above makes it obvious that there are not many schools that have improved their performance in 2024. We have made the biggest gain for a combination of reasons. **One that we need to take note is our 'No Digital Screen' policy.** The addiction to the digital screen has become such a distraction that students are being hindered from achieving their best.

Data included in this section were obtained from the 'My School' website. Due to COVID-19 lockdown we did not have NAPLAN tests in 2020. For 2024, the socio-economic standard of our families was 1087 slightly up from 1084 in 2023, which is slightly above average. LCCC still caters for many needy families. For the vast majority of families, English is not their first language. In reality, 90% of our families are from language background other than English and more than 85% of our students will not use English except at school. This is one of the reasons why we continue to offer free English tuition after school. We also have allocated more lessons for teaching the English Language.



Despite the disadvantage of being from non-English speaking background, our students performed very well right across the board. We continue to work hard to help our students succeed.

Student background



Doing such an outstanding job of helping our students succeed does not bring any financial benefit to the school. In Australia the converse is true. Schools with weaker performance are considered as needing more funding. Our major incentive is to fulfil the heavenly vision.

As most of you are aware, we started Bible comprehension on a daily basis (as homework) 6 years ago. This was a God inspired initiative that continues to bear fruit. Our students are becoming more familiar with what the Bible says while they make significant progress in their Reading Comprehension and essay writing. This is also drawing some families together to do their devotion around the Bible passages being

read. We have continued the intensive reading classes for younger students who are not making sufficient progress in reading.

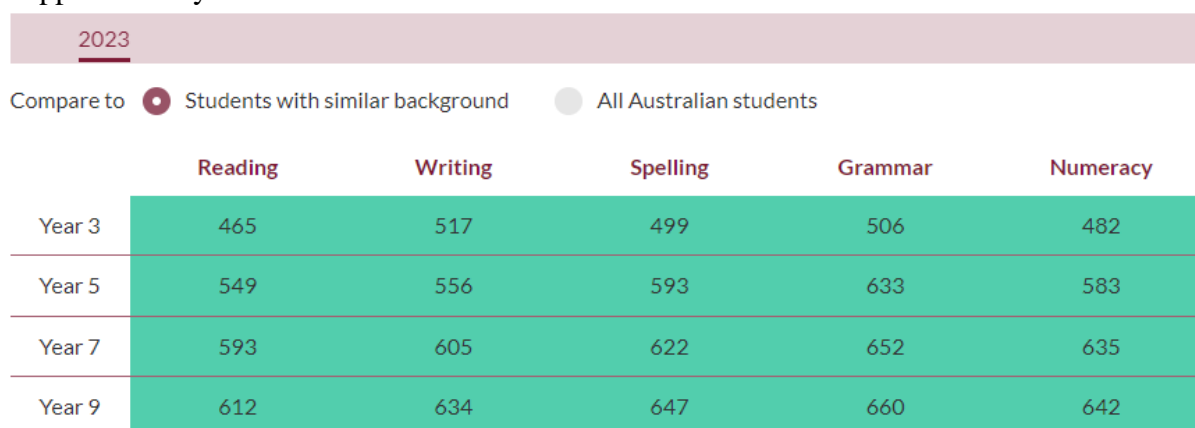

makes it obvious that the average performance of our students is well above that of similar schools and the state in all areas of assessment. LCCC students have continued to make great progress in reading over the last 5 years. We give glory to God for such exceptionally good results. Special thanks to our teachers and parents.

Students sit for NAPLAN in Grade 3, Grade 5, Year 7 and Year 9. To be able to judge the progress made by students in 2024, we need to compare their performance in 2022, 2020 (no data due to Covid) and 2018. Students in Grade 3 in 2018 would not have sat for Grade 5 Naplan in 2020 but did their Year 7 Naplan in 2022 and Year 9 Naplan in 2024. LCCC students have maintained their progress over the years due to God's commitment to them, consistency of education at school and follow up at home. This progress is an outstanding achievement for a school like ours where the majority only speak English as a second language. May I acknowledge the extra effort put in by our English teachers Mrs Simon, Mrs Johnson, Mrs. Wesley, Mrs Reny, Mrs Burratto, Mrs Alex, Mrs. Varghese, Mrs Graceline, Mrs Wankadia, Mr. Choi and Mrs Choi, etc. to achieve this progress. We acknowledge and thank these staff for their service to LCCC over extended period of time (up to 18 years).

Our students have also performed exceptionally well in Numeracy at all levels. Mr George, Mrs Yong, Mrs Glory, Mrs Jacob, Mrs. Fang, Mrs. Joseph, and Mrs. Ravuru along with Prep to Grade 2 teachers are to be congratulated for their input in achieving this success. As can be observed from the tabulated figures given, we had outstanding performances in Literacy and Numeracy. In most areas the lowest figure in the range given to our results is above the average figure given to similar schools. For instance, in 2024 Grade 3 result by looking at the range for Grade 3 Numeracy; LCCC's low is 445 while the figure given as average for similar schools is 422. In Grade 5 numeracy, from looking at the range our low is 566 and similar schools' average is 513. We can observe the same pattern in all the results. LCCC's lower result within the range, is much higher than the average of similar schools and the state average. In Writing, we have performed best in 2024 at every year level except Grade 3, setting a record. The daily writing for Bible Comprehension essays by many classes is partly responsible for this progress. In Reading we have maintained our lead against similar schools. (Refer to 'My School' website for the above information.)

By Grade 3 LCCC students continue to close the gap on advantaged students in the state and are well ahead of the state average. Our no nonsense Prep to Grade 2 teaching is focused on developing Literacy and Numeracy skills. With disciplined classrooms without noise and distractions students can get on with their learning and teachers with their teaching.

Students get up to 9 hours per week for Literacy and 9 hours for numeracy in early years which allows us to lay a good foundation. This result is a product of the combined efforts of teachers from Prep to Grade 3. We want to acknowledge the efforts of parents in helping children with their reading and spelling. Thanks for following up on their homework. The partnership is certainly working.

Year 9's broke our past records in Reading, Writing and Grammar. Outstanding performance! We need our students to take their success into VCE years. Our students have a good foundation in Literacy and Numeracy for their future studies and career.

Our writing results at all levels have improved. In 2023 we achieved the highest mean score for writing since 2017. In 2024 we have improved on 2023 result in Grade 5, Year 7 and Year 9; which is a great achievement. Generally, only girls do well in writing, but LCCC boys are doing well in keeping up with the girls.

The mean of LCCC students was 31 points ahead of the mean of similar schools in Reading at Grade 3 whereas that lead has dropped to 16 in 2024. Our lead against similar schools in writing increased marginally from 73 to 75. Generally, the greatest lead LCCC students have against similar schools is in Spelling and Grammar & Punctuation. It is very important that students begin their early years of study at LCCC as it becomes more difficult for them to catch up in later years. Students also progress rapidly in character development and spiritual maturity in those early years.

The Better Education ranking, which ranks by Reading, Writing and Numeracy performance, placed us as the 18th best performer in 2024 amongst Primary schools (we were 10th in 2023). Amongst the Secondary schools we came 11th best performer with the first 4 being selective schools which begin in Year 9. Hence we could consider ourselves the 7th best performer if we disregard those 4 schools. We have performed consistently over the years having been ranked the 13th best performer in 2023 and 11th best performing school in 2022 and 2021. I sincerely thank the school community for your whole hearted support in enabling the academic success of our children. Homework is part of the secret to our students' success. Our disciplined classrooms and explicit form of teaching promotes academic excellence.

The following partial tables gives an indication of where our cohort of students stand amongst the top schools in the various Naplan tests.

Amongst Grade 3 students from the table of top ranking schools, our students were ranked about 38th in Reading.

In Writing LCCC came number 2 – a great achievement!

In Spelling we were number 13.

In Grammar and Punctuation we were number 16.

In Numeracy we came number 33.

Shows that our students are fast catching up with the more affluent schools but we still have plenty of room to improve.

In the 2021 survey parents were asked 52 questions. Majority (more than 95%) of our families were able to participate in it. In the second column are the questions that were asked. The third column gives the number of families that responded to the question. In question 1 parents were asked to rank the school on a scale from 1 to 10 as to if the school treats students from different backgrounds equally. The higher the ranking the more the respondent agreed with the statement. 68% rated the school at 10 meaning that 68% of the families agreed that there was equal treatment for students from different backgrounds. The last column shows the percentage of families that rated LCCC between 8 and 10 which in the case of the first question 91.8% did. Clearly the vast majority of our parents are very satisfied with the school and partner diligently with LCCC to help their children excel in their education. Only a few parents ever rated LCCC below 7. We did not do a survey in 2022 but in 2023 we did another survey amongst the parent community. The survey results in 2023 (though with a smaller sample of 348 families and some questions being different) confirmed that the families were still just as pleased with what they were

VCE Results and Tertiary Offers 2024/25

We give all praise to God for the outstanding achievements of 2024. Our 12th cohort consisted of 51 students.

Australian Tertiary Admission Rank

This year, 12 students achieved an ATAR above 90, placing them in the top 10% of the state based on their aggregate study scores. Grace Quiambao earned our highest ATAR of 97.55. Our median ATAR was 73.58, and notably, 25% of our students attained a score above 90. Among the 51 students who successfully completed their VCE, three did so without an ATAR.

Study Scores

In 2024, we recorded 20 study scores exceeding 40. A score above 40 places a student in the top 9% of the state, making this a truly remarkable achievement for our students. Melvina Gopi achieved the highest individual study score of 46 in Business Management, while Grace Quiambao earned a study score of 46 in English. Additionally, our median study score for the year was 30, aligning with the state average. Maintaining a median study score of 30 or higher for the past four years is a testament to the strength of our VCE program.

AEDC Survey for Preps.

LCCC also participated in the AEDC Survey in 2024. Mrs. Bianca carried out the survey for LCCC. The Australian Early Development Census found that almost all our students were on track in every area assessed. That means that all 2024 Prep intake were coping well physically (98.6%), socially (100%), emotionally (100%), in their language and cognitive skills (98.6%) as well as their communication skills (98.6%). This is partly due to the pre Prep partnership with parents to prepare their children for school. Credit goes to Miss Zoe who interviews new students and their parents for making the parents prepare their children for schooling at LCCC.

Value added

The many activities that were carried out by the school were gratefully received by our students who know very well that we are a rewarding educational institution. Activities included end of term excursions, class parties, Year 7/8 Camp and Senior Camp, Athletics Carnival, Concert Night, Fun Fair, After school and Holiday Tuition. Students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition, Prime Minister's Spelling Bee, Public Speaking, Bible Challenge, School Spelling Bee, Swimming lessons for primary students and Tennis & Badminton coaching for secondary students. We had two Presentations Nights, Grade 6 Graduation, Year 12 Graduation, Prep 100 Days celebration, Naplan success parties etc. Students in Year 7 received free Soft Shell Jackets to keep themselves warm in winter while VCE students received Blazers in Year 10. Canteen once a week and fundraisers (Jump Rope for Heart) are also sprinkles of joy in their school life. Chapels every morning and visiting speakers refresh the study weary souls regularly. We thank God for His help and acknowledge the many hours of added work by committed staff and volunteers. The school looks exceptionally clean and the gardens well kept by our Maintenance staff and Cleaning team. Thanks to the Bus Drivers who provide door to door service for almost half the students at the school. The school provides this service at a discounted rate for the benefit of families who have work commitments. Daily chapels involving prayer, worship in songs and learning of the Word by writing essays improved the spirituality of our students.

Leadership and financial state of the school

I am blessed to be the Principal of this school since its inception. The excellent organisation and smooth running of the school can be attributed to the dedicated and responsible staff of the school. Mr Cicchiello (Deputy Principal), Mrs Simon (In charge of development from Prep to Year 8) and Mr. Wong who has been responsible for the VCE years Year 9 to Year 12 have provided strong and stable leadership.

Mrs Mathews, who is the Business Manager has continued to help families plan their finances, and manage LCCC finances in such a way that we were able to give bonuses to all our staff and still have a positive balance. LCCC continues to be a debt free school!

Our financial performance for 2024 is as reported on the next page. As you will notice our major contributor of funds is the Commonwealth Government, without which a school like ours would not be able to help families who are disadvantaged financially. The State Government was the next biggest contributor to our income. As a community, we only contributed a small portion (10.4%) to our school's recurrent income. We thank the Governments for their support in our efforts to make Australia a better nation and assure them that this school continues to be one of their best investments. As expected, our major expenditure was salaries which made up 79% of our recurrent expenditure.

Miss Zoe who is our Administration Manager continues to streamline the school office and its procedures. She also makes all our events extra special and memorable. She is also the first point of contact for parents seeking admission for their children. Being a good communicator, she has helped communicate the vision of the school to both parents and students I would like to acknowledge the valuable IT support that the school receives from Mr Jinil. NAPLAN is now on line and so is most of our administrative processes like attendance, parent teacher interview bookings etc.

Our College Council members are actively working behind the scenes to steer the college in the way God wants it to. They are a steadfast and dedicated team who are unwavering in making sure that we keep our God given course. We can thank them for their prayerful and wise decisions as well as their unity. The College Council is made up of Ps Phil Cayzer, Mr Jacob Mathews, Mr Michael Goode, Mr Darren Evans, Mr Gregory Ohlson, Ps I. B. Williams, Mr Anthony Fernando, Mr Blessing Nhliziyo, Mrs Shanta Mathews and Mr Emanuele Cicchiello. All major decisions are made with the blessing and guidance of this team. In 2024 the College Council was very much involved in the VRQA audit of LCCC. They had to go through many school policies and approve all necessary changes to meet Government requirements. The VRQA made sure that we were abiding by the Ministerial orders and guided us in making our policies comply while the College Council made sure that changes made to policy abided with our core beliefs. The College Council also had to work through requirements for our campus in Mildura which has been approved by VRQA in July 2025. The Council also prays for the school and its community for about half an hour at each Council meeting. Please keep all those in leadership in your prayers as we are so dependent on God for His guidance and success.
